Bill Turner, a race horse trainer near London, England has undertaken a client of a different stripe. His name is Zebdee and he's a 16month-old zebra. "They say they're unbreakable, but it's something I've always wanted to do," said Turner, who's ridden over 600 winning race horses during the past thirty years. The trainer rides Zebdee all around town, even visiting the local pub in a nearby town. Zebras are African members of the horse family, but are actually more closely related to donkeys than Thoroughbreds. Breaking in zebras is difficult but doable, according to a zebra authority from the Marwell Zoological Park. "It's perfectly feasible. Don't forget that all our domestic animals at one time were wild...dogs were wolves and cows were wild oxen."

Imprinting, the act of handling a foal from birth to make it more people and socially oriented, is coming under fire from researchers at a French University. 
Minnow was a Chincoteague Pony born to a band of wild horses on Assateague Island on Maryland's Eastern shores. Rounded up and
